DID YOU KNOW?

- DOGS IN CARS • When it's 85 degrees outside the temperature inside a closed car can reach 104 degrees in just ten minutes. Animals confined to such vehicles can suffer and die from heatstroke and dehydration.
- A PA law grants law enforcement officers, humane officers, animal control officers, and first responders the authority to break into motor vehicles to rescue cats and dogs they believe are in imminent danger of suffering harm.
- This law doesn't just apply to cats and dogs suffering from heat but also those suffering from cold weather or any other form of distress.
- Extreme heat is dangerous to cats and dogs.
